# EUMC COMMUNICATION COMMITTEE 2020 Charge Conference Report

The Communications Committee kicked off the New Year accomplishing tasks needed to publicize our Joy of Faith Weekend in early February. We were responsible for getting it publicized in local papers, getting the word out to members, families and friends, producing a radio commercial with WXCY that Pastor Karen recorded, and arranging for before and after coverage in the Cecil Whig.

The next order of business was to prepare a press release for the Cecil Whig detailing background information on Pastor Karen Bunnell and her impending retirement. An interview was arranged with Jane Marshall, reporter at the Whig, and an in-depth article was subsequently printed in the Cecil Whig.

And then the unprecedented global COVID 19 pandemic struck and life, as we knew it, changed dramatically. We were locked down and shut in so we could protect ourselves and others from this insidious virus. Our church doors were closed and all church functions ceased, other than online virtual worship services, which our new pastor, Rev. Eric Warner, was tasked with as he took over as our leader.

We finally re-opened very carefully and cautiously on October 6<sup>th</sup> for in-person worship services combining our 8:30am and 11:00am services into one 10:00am service. Our Administrative Council met in person for the first time on Tuesday, October 22<sup>nd</sup> to discuss plans to move forward while still under threat of the virus. Individual group committees will begin to meet as needed as events are planned and organized. And the Communications Committee will be on hand to assist in getting the word out.

Our Tech Team members under the leadership of Roger Robinson and Joe Buckley, have done an excellent job throughout the pandemic bringing us weekly online virtual recordings of worship services and we've even managed to gain a new team member or two. New portable personal microphone equipment will be purchased to assist with sound consistency of musical offerings during worship services.

It is an understatement to declare 2020 has been a huge challenge to our webmaster, Jeff Bunnell, who has worked tirelessly to ensure our online services are produced, edited, and posted online in a timely manner to make sure we can all still gather, albeit virtually, for weekly worship. His work efforts have more than doubled the amount of hours he devoted to serving EUMC and his salary has been adjusted accordingly to compensate him for his additional time and efforts on our behalf.

The Communications Committee will continue to be proactive in promoting events, activities, and weekly services to the general public. Keeping our website up to date is vital since it is a 'public' forum with no membership required to view, and Facebook is a great social media tool, so we will continue to keep our information timely as our church reopens and events are scheduled. We will be selling our EUMC cookbooks on Friday, November 6<sup>th</sup> and November 13<sup>th</sup> in Weldin Hall from 10:00am until 11:30am to kick off the holiday season. And our Christmas services will be announced to the public via the Cecil Whig.

At this year draws to a close, we are anticipating a very slow reopening in 2021 and the postponement of many annual events due to the continuation of the virus making in-person gatherings unsafe. The Communications Committee will work closely with our church committees to get the word out, keep our website and Facebook page current, as well as using print medium to keep our members and the public well informed.
