Dear Friends,

If you're ever on Facebook or other social media, you know that, after a while, they figure out who you are and what you like, and start posting things specifically for you. For instance, I love animal stories, particularly stories about animals being rescued or animals being reunited with their owners after being separated, so my FB page shows an overabundance of those stories - which usually makes for a good cry every once in a while!

At the end of January 2020, the Ministries Fund was in the black by the amount of \$3,280.51. The total income received for January was \$43,911.00 and the total expenses were \$40,630.49.

The Building Fund had a CD that matured on January 29, 2020. This was a 12-month CD at a rate of 2.35%. The original investment was \$50,000.00 and upon maturing, the amount was \$51,184.47. At this time, interest rates are not conducive to investing in another CD so the money was deposited into the Money Market account that is yielding 2.06%, and this all transpired on February 6th. The Money Market, at the end of January, had a total of \$95,000.00 - \$65,000.00 of the Building Fund and \$30,000.00 of the Ministries Fund. The interest received in January was \$103.20, with the total interest earned since opening the account being \$601.08. The church opened the Money Market account

on August 22, 2019 with \$10,000.00 from the Building Fund and in September deposited \$55,000.00 from the same fund. In November, \$30,000.00 was deposited into the Money Market from the Ministries Fund. Putting the funds into a Money Market will allow the church to make interest on funds that are not immediately needed and also give ready access to the money without penalty.

MEETING GROUND EMERGENCY ROTATING HOMELESS SHELTER

Thank you, everybody; we did it! Elkton UMC, the Cecilton Parish UMC, Haven of Hope, and some good neighbors hosted around 20 guests per night for the Emergency Rotating Homeless Shelter. They were our guests for a couple of nights when the temperature dropped to 16 and 17 degrees with 2.67 inches of cold rain, neither of which would have been conducive to safety or comfort living in a tent.

If you had to guess, how many volunteers do you think it took to pull this off? In case you are having a hard time guessing, here are some of the ways folks helped: site supervisor, overnight hosts, intake hosts, medication box host, evening host, delicious dinners, scrumptious breakfasts on the weekend, laundry, food and snacks, cleaning supplies, paper products, dinnerware, drinks, and toiletries.

Here are some of the things that the shelter guests wrote in the thank you cards that they signed at the end of the week:

"Thank you for volunteering. We appreciate the time you gave for us."

"Thank you for making the rotating shelter possible by volunteering."

There's not a day that goes by where I am not grateful for the blessings from God's people; the encouragement, the games, the food, the clothes, and a warm bed to weather this winter storm. According to the volunteer logbook, there were over eighty people involved in keeping the shelter open for this, the third of eleven weeks that the shelter will be open this season. We hope we can provide a safe place for our guests for even more weeks next year. Thank you for your time and gifts.


